Congratulations to Phyllis Lewis-Hale and Jung-Won Shin, who ran the competitions beautifully as usual. Stephanie Holmes deserves extra credit for remaining calm despite unforeseen last-minute problems with printers. Finally, our gratitude goes to the Hattiesburg Music Teachers League for the elegant guest artist recital reception, as well as for providing students for the masterclass.

As always, we are grateful to the Mississippi Arts Council for their generous grant that makes our conference and competitions possible.

On the flip side, it is concerning that conference attendance is a bit lower each year. There were 36 paid registrants and 12 students/sponsored first-time attendees, bringing total attendance to 48 (we had 55 last year at Millsaps College. That is 34%

of total membership, which is good, and certainly, membership in MMTA and MTNA have trended downwards over the years. Dear Members of MMTA:

I am writing to you now as Immediate Past President of MMTA, as Vickie Johnson and her new Board have taken the reins. Below are important updates to our Pre-College Evaluations and Finals Guidelines/Syllabus, as well as to Collegiate Competition Procedures. During the last months of my presidency, various changes to this document were voted on and implemented in the Executive Board meetings. I hope you are already aware of these changes, but because they are so important, I feel the need to reiterate them. Please discard old versions of the Guidelines and use ONLY the current one, which is available on our web site at http://www.msmusicteachers.org/precollege/guidelines.pdf. I urge you to study the Guidelines, so you will be fresh on the rules and regulations regarding the Evaluations and Finals. Below are some of the updates.

Topic: Make-ups for MMTA Evaluations

I. District Evaluations

A. Requirements & Scheduling (page 1)

"Students who cannot attend MMTA Evaluations in their own district may participate in a different district. No other make-ups are allowed."

The rationale by the Board is that if students are evaluated on a different day, they have a different judge, which can affect the overall outcome of the Evaluations awards and the Finals.

Topic: Sonata/Sonatina movements

II. District Evaluations

B. Guidelines for District Evaluations (page 1)

"Sonata/Sonatina: Judges will hear entire sonata or sonatina consisting of at least 2 movements. Memorization required of pianists."

This update will eliminate frequent confusion about one-movement Sonatas/Sonatinas.

Topic: One judge per piano competition:

III. Pre-College Finals

G. Judges' Guidelines: MMTA Pre-College Finals

"Students performing at Finals have already participated in District Evaluations where they were judged Superior in Performance for their event, and met other stringent qualifying tests, which vary by level and medium. At Finals, one judge shall adjudicate each recital in Guitar, Brass & Woodwinds, Strings, Voice, or Piano.

Previously, two judges have adjudicated piano competitions at the Finals, but the Executive Board voted to have only one judge per piano competition.

Topic: Numbering of measures for Collegiate Competitions

On the web page entitled "Student Activities," under the "College Information" tab, in the section named "Competition Procedure," 2^{nd} paragraph, it reads: "Measures must be numbered at the beginning of each system."

This is a change from the requirement that every measure be numbered.

Thank you for being great colleagues. I would like to especially thank the Executive Board, Yvonne Young-Magrath and Janine Beasley for working together and making sure these changes were entered on our web site.


