The Mississippi Arts Commission Project Grant requested last March to support our fall conference and Collegiate Competitions has been approved. The conference will be held at Hinds Community College in Raymond on November 5-6, 2021. The Collegiate Competitions will take place at Delta State University in Cleveland on Saturday, March 5, 2022.

Dr. Ken Renfrow, Alfred author and professor of piano pedagogy at Bob Jones University, will be our clinician for the state conference this November. The guest artists for the conference will be UAB (The University of Alabama at Birmingham) Chamber Trio (trumpet, clarinet, and piano). The commissioned composer for the conference will be Mr. Aaron Patrick Mann, an active Mississippi-born composer. Dr. Naoki Hakutani, Associate Professor of Piano at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, will be our Speaker for IMTF Luncheon and Piano Judge for Pre-College Concerto Competitions.

Both the conference call for proposals and the call for the new faculty recital have been announced to our members. The deadline for conference proposals is September 12. Any new music faculty member in Mississippi is invited to perform at the new faculty recital during the conference. The submission deadline for the new faculty recital is September 20. As you know, this past fiscal year has been very unusual for MMTA due to Covid. We finished the 2020-21 fiscal year with a net gain of approximately \$7,500. This gain is mainly due to the fact that many of our MMTA events were held virtually instead of in person. This in turn cut down on expenses we would have normally incurred. We currently have a cash balance of \$68,310.91.

Rebekah Moore-Schultz and Katie Johnson performed a four-hand work at the end and our students enjoyed hearing their teachers play. We are considering having two keyboards next time, so students can perform their concerti for a live audience.

Several of us participated in MMTA Auditions in the Spring and are preparing our students for another virtual concerto competition.
